✓ Who can vote?

U.S. citizen + GA resident + 18+ on Election Day
+ Registered + Resident of county registered in

✉ Can I vote by mail?

Yes, any Georgia voter may vote by mail, also known as an absentee ballot. You may request an absentee ballot from your County Registrar online, by mail, in person, by fax, or by email. Your request must be received by Oct. 23. Your ballot must be received by the County Registrar by 7 p.m. on Election Day.

📄 Do I need photo ID to vote?

Yes. Georgia requires photo ID. You can use a Georgia driver's license (expired OK) or any valid U.S. or Georgia government employee ID (including county, city, or other local government), Georgia public college student ID, US passport, US military ID, or tribal ID.

📄 Did you know?

If you do not have an acceptable form of photo ID, you may obtain a free ID from any county registrar office or any Georgia Department of Drivers Services office.

🇪🇸 Help in Spanish? ¿Ayuda en español?

Only Gwinnett County must provide bilingual election materials and Spanish language assistance to voters who need it.
Solo el condado de Gwinnett está obligado a proporcionar material electoral bilingüe y asistencia en español a los votantes que lo necesiten.

❓ Can someone help me vote?

Yes. If you are disabled or need help with English, you may bring anyone you choose to assist you — except your employer or a union representative. The helper does not need to be a registered voter. You can also receive help from a poll worker.

⚠ Not on voter list? Problem with ID?

If there is any problem accepting you as a voter, ask for a provisional ballot. If you voted provisionally because you lacked photo ID, you must bring acceptable ID to the registrar's office within three calendar days of the election.

⚖ What if I have a felony conviction?

You can register and vote *if* you are not currently serving a sentence for a felony involving moral turpitude. This includes incarceration, probation, and parole.
